# SENIOR PASTOR'S REPORT REV. LESLIE WOOD

Transition is never comfortable, whether it's pursued or a surprise. Transition in the middle of a pandemic brings its own unique challenges. The announcement that Rev. Steve Goodier would be retiring as of June 30<sup>th</sup> certainly created additional unease to an already uneasy time. Rev. Steve's capable leadership over the past six years was notable in his expertise and love of God and all of God's people. FUMC Loveland was more stable, vital and financially healthy as a result of his pastoral guidance. As a result, during the sudden and absolutely necessary pandemic-induced learning curves and adjustments – a heavy burden to carry – FUMC not only remained solvent, but the church remained moving forward in its mission and ministries.

From the first day of pandemic-induced shutdown in March of 2020, FUMC has remained committed to providing meaningful worship to the people of FUMC, and also to others who found themselves seeking a place of spiritual grace and hope. Church staff and lay leadership have worked diligently to provide a variety of worship experiences...livestream, outdoors under The Big Tree and, beginning in May of 2021, hybrid worship where the faithful gathered indoors in the sanctuary while simultaneously livestreaming the service on FUMC's YouTube channel. During this time, worship numbers have remained fairly constant across all platforms.

In order to facilitate FUMC's new reality of hybrid worship, Mikeal Macbeth was hired just over one year ago as the audio-visual coordinator. His expertise in audio visual and live production has been invaluable to the smooth transition to digital and hybrid worship. Mikeal has recently resigned to pursue a permanent, full-time job opportunity. However, under his guidance FUMC has set the foundation to visioning and implementation of a true interconnected church community, building a Beloved Community that extends beyond the brick and mortar, out into the world through our digital connections. We look forward to hiring a new AV Coordinator to take the church to the next step.

Of course, over the past year FUMC has discovered the value and broad reach of digital beyond the worship service, too. Ministry committees are able to meet more efficiently in an online setting. Bible studies and small groups and book discussions are able to gather, even when they are unable to gather in person. With a bit of creative thinking, missional efforts continue to touch the lives of neighbors within the Loveland community and beyond. Even international missions to Guatemala have been maintained online, while we haven't been able to send a team to work in person. Where there's a will, there's a way, as the saying goes. The people of FUMC have proven that truth. Now that groups can meet in-person again, the combined opportunities for in-person and online ministry have opened new ways for God to work through FUMC.

That said, the pandemic, truthfully, has had an economic impact. Like most churches and business and school administrations have realized over the last long year and a half, budgeting has become a greater challenge than usual. While the church remains in a healthy financial position, FUMC's capable finance team and staff leadership are beginning to consider how to encourage and generate thoughtful ministry support through additional financial giving from our expanding hybrid faith community.

COVID continues to be a stressor and will be for the foreseeable future. Balancing the fickle data and making decisions that are increasingly difficult is a constant challenge. Decisions are always evolving. This church is dedicated and intentional about moving forward. FUMC has a strong and dedicated staff and lay leadership. Everyone is doing remarkable work in their ministries during a challenging time.

During it all, ministry keeps happening. FUMC was blessed to host our brothers and sisters from Trinity UMC after a major flooding event at their church. For four months, FUMC was a gracious host and TUMC were grateful guests. We shared sacred space and even worshiped together during a meaningful Labor Day combined service. We hope to enjoy more opportunities to worship God and serve God's people together with TUMC in the future.

Of course, with General Conference 2020 finally scheduled to happen in August 2022, the next year is bound to bring its own new set of stressors and challenges and transitions as the GC delegates vote on whether it's time for the UMC to separate. Like the challenge and transitions demanded by COVID, I have no doubt that FUMC will meet any challenges that ensue and be shaped into an even brighter light for Jesus Christ in this community and into the world.

Transitions are always challenging. Sometimes downright hard. Transitions during a pandemic bring its own set of difficulties. Thankfully, here at FUMC those transition-during-a-pandemic challenges are offset by laity and staff leadership that are passionate and intentional about moving this church forward into a fresh, new vital future.

I continue to serve as the Director of Recruitment & Community Engagement with Work Options where our mission is to help people overcame barriers to sustainable employment by building confidence while providing resources and culinary job training. I was instrumental in transitioning to our new d/b/a "Work Options" to ensure that we are more accurately reflecting the populations we serve, not just women but all gender identities and expressions. Further, we have launched two new training sites, including a preand post-release program at Denver Women's Correctional Facility in Denver, CO, and our staff and students have prepared over 115,000 emergency meals while our Helping Hen Food Truck has helped in the delivery of them, collaborating with several of our community partners. In addition, I have enrolled 114 students this year with the hopes of meeting the goal of 125 by year end.

In June and after almost seven years, I resigned from my volunteer police chaplain position at the Loveland Police Department. While it was a hard decision, I needed to prioritize my time and talents to the October launching of a podcast my sister and I produced called, "The Walls with Kristi & Cindy," a podcast about women reinventing themselves through incarceration.

Regarding my service in the local church First UMC-Loveland, I continue to officiate weddings and funeral-memorial services while also serving as an Usher and participating in both Habit for Humanity builds as well as the Anti-racism Allyship group.

My continuing education pursuits have included books, podcasts, seminars, small group discussions, etc. on a variety of topics including grief and loss, trauma informed care, Alzheimer's training: first responder and de-escalation.

#### **2021 ABIDING MEMORIALS COMMITTEE REPORT**

Once again the Abiding Memorials Committee had a quiet year. A request for memorial funds was received in late June from Mikeal Macbeth, A/V Coordinator, requesting memorial funds so the failing speaker system in the sanctuary could be replaced. The Abiding Memorials Committee approved the requested funds for the new speakers. Unfortunately due to the "supply chain" problems and the lack of availability of product, the needed equipment did not arrive until October. Installation of the speakers has now been completed.

Due to the pandemic and the inability to hold memorials in the church throughout most of 2021, the Abiding Memorials Fund did not receive many memorial donations this past year. Despite the small increase in available funds, the Abiding Memorials Fund is still in a good position to continue to provide financial help where needed throughout the church.

#### **CHANCEL CHOIR**

In the Winter and Spring of 2021, the Chancel Choir continued to meet and record one anthemvideo per month for the on-line Sunday services. Under the direction of David Dunbar, the Choir met on Sunday afternoons at the Fairgrounds Park Pavilion to rehearse and record. The 'honking' of geese flying overhead and the occasional passing train often prompted multiple 'takes;' still, the effort kept the Choir engaged and provided music for six services. Joy Shaw was instrumental in initiating this activity and keeping the Chancel Choir together.

Two of those anthems performed in the spring were composed on commission by David Dunbar. The commission project was funded by donations from the congregation—the funds served to augment David Dunbar's salary which had been significantly reduced due to the pandemic. The donations were sufficient to commission three works. Dr. Dunbar has received one half of the commission for the third work and will receive the other half upon receipt of that work.

In August, Chris White, a member of the Chancel Choir, volunteered and was subsequently hired to conduct the ensemble as a one-year interim choir director for a token salary of \$25 per month. Beginning in September, the Chancel Choir began rehearsing outdoors on Wednesday evenings and performed their first anthems for the 8:30 a.m. Sunday service on the last Sunday of that month. In October, the choir began rehearsing in Coy Hall wearing masks.

Several volunteers from the choir, met on two occasions to file new selections of music in the choral library. Due to the lack of filing cabinets and the sudden onset of the pandemic, more than 900 copies of music had simply accumulated in disorganized piles on top of filing cabinets. The titles of each selection were entered into the electronic record of holdings, the selections were placed in folders, and filed in two abandoned cabinets discovered in the adjoining furnace room. Further, outdated music anthologies and secular selections that would never be performed were gathered and discarded in the recycle bin. (For instance, I cannot think of any

occasion at which the Chancel Choir would sing "Chattanooga Choo Choo" or "Zum gali," both of which were taking up valuable space in the cabinets.) Finally, two volunteers cleaned and reconfigured the Choir Rehearsal Room to prepare it for the resumption of indoor rehearsals in that space when it is permitted.

Most important, by December 31, the members of the Chancel Choir will have performed an anthem at the 8:30 a.m. service for eight Sundays and a 25-minute Christmas cantata for a ninth Sunday. The average choir attendance for the rehearsals and Sunday service performances is 23 singers.

#### **2021 FAMILY MINISTRIES REPORT**

In January and February, we were still trying to connect safely. In youth we were zooming during lunch on Wednesdays and for children we were zooming for Sunday school on Sundays. Once the weather started getting better in March, we were able to meet for youth outside on Sundays after church and have breakfast on Wednesdays at a local coffee shop. The Family Outreach committee set up an Easter Prayer walk around the outside of the church. We celebrated the graduates in May for senior Sunday. The youth were excited to be able to go on our mission trip in June to Houston. We took fourteen youth and five adults this year. Three students went to Buckhorn Camp for summer camp in July. We had a relaxed summer meeting on Sundays for fun activities like French fry tasting, camping, disc golf, Thursday night bike rides and LOTS of pizza. We offered Wednesday morning story-time for our pre-k/elementary aged kids. Various people volunteered to read at different parks throughout Loveland. Fall has been slightly more normal since we have been able to be in the building more regularly. Sunday school for Little Learners and Elementary started back up in person. We also have seven teens in confirmation class on Sunday mornings and were able to have a confirmation bonding retreat at Buckhorn camp. The youth meet for breakfast on Wednesdays. Youth group attendance has been small with other fall activities, but we have fun when we meet. In October, we hired Shannon Heusinkveld as the Children's Coordinator and she is doing a fantastic job. Trunk 'R Treat was a large success. We had about fifteen trunks and the teens provided games in between the cars. We estimated that we had about one hundred people come through enjoying games, candy, popcorn, and hot cider. In November we will have the Hanging of the Greens advent service created by Susan Harding and led by the children and youth with some special ensembles from the adults. Many thanks and much appreciation for all the staff and volunteers that keep the nursery, children, and youth departments active and welcoming to families.

#### FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

The Finance Committee monitored church finances in 2021 through email and a few on-line meetings. The church saw very strong giving levels in the first three months of the year. Since then, we have operated nearly every month at a deficit. Overall, income is close to the budgeted amount, and expenses are far below expected due to light building usage. The result is that we are slightly ahead of budget overall. The church's cash position remains healthy. However, the committee is concerned about church finances going forward. In November, we completed our review of the proposed 2022 budget. Despite the committee's best efforts, the draft budget shows a significant deficit. This was forwarded to Church Council for action, with suggestions to aid the church in operating within its expected income.

During the summer we focused on organization for our booth at the Foote Lagoon concerts handing out popcorn and water. Our committee was able to participate in 1 of 4 nights at the Foote Lagoon which was very nice!

Our group currently has 4 members but we are always looking for new members.

Requests for long sleeve shirts have been made so we will look into that.

Marketing and Outreach helped to promote the October Pet Blessing. We posted it in the Faith notes section of the newspaper, added it to the online Boulder events calendar which is shared across other newspapers and media, put three signs outside the church and shared the event on multiple local Facebook group pages.

Our last meeting was centered around organizing a donation drive for 137 Homeless Connection and found a group already doing a city wide event so we are happy to be a drop of site for the cause.

We have submitted our purpose statement to Shirley Reed. "Marketing and Outreach is responsible for developing and executing marketing campaigns to reach new people and families of all ages in the Loveland, CO community and beyond."

We strive to communicate that our church is available to help with questions about God and faith and offer a place to worship, find community and support.

#### MISSIONS COMMITTEE REPORT

It is a privilege to serve on the Missions Committee in leading the congregation in presenting Christ's love and care in responding to needs of the earth and its people: our community and across our state, nation and the world. The people of FUMC Loveland respond with remarkable generosity in every manner of caring and charity through their gifts of time, talent and prayer.

Marketing and Outreach Committee requested a mission statement for our public relations resources. The Committee collaborated to produce the following statement

"Our goal is to help people find joy in serving others. We do this by promoting apportunities."

"Our goal is to help people find joy in serving others. We do this by promoting opportunities to volunteer at, financially support and/or pray for non-profit partners that provide essential services to our neighbors in Loveland, all 50 states and all around the world. We encourage people of all ages to share their talents, skills, knowledge, love, and treasure in ways that will transform this world into a more just and safer place".

The Committee has been composed of Roger Williams, Betsy and Mark Eliot, Barry and Phyllis Wehrle, Dan Robinson, Tom Thompson and Pastor Less Anderson Harris. Seasonal projects have included Julie Monroe (Mission begins at Home/Christmas Food baskets), Terri Gindlesparger and Pam Erickson (Angel Tree). We have had the active participation and support of the entire congregation [a few hundred people].

The Annual Christmas Offering of \$10,070+ was directed to mission partners: Salvation Army, Food Bank of Larimer County and the Community Kitchen.

Mark Eliot has succeeded Leroy Cline as our Habitat liaison. Betsy Eliot is coordinating denominational Special Offerings with Patty Gregory. Mark Eliot began a quarterly colorful Quarterly Missions Memo early in the year. It both tells the story of future opportunities as well as thanks the congregation for their support.

We began the year with a presentation to our Searchers class entitled "What About Mission?" It was an hour long description of our partner agencies and volunteering relationships; an attempt to pull together all of the missions activities of the congregation. In order to introduce others to volunteering at the Food Bank a Saturday event was held with appreciations and success.

This year the Easter Offering was directed to UMCOR Disaster Relief, Loveland's Habitat "Faith Build" and Pura Vida's unfunded students scholarships Lemoa, Guatemala, [\$3166.67 to each program]. The Committee sustains partnerships for the congregation with a wide variety of agencies and organizations, local, national and international: Principal programs include:

Truscott Elementary School in gathering of classroom supplies, Salvation Army, One Community One Family (now a part of Homeward Alliance, Ft Collins), Habitat for Humanity, 137 Connection, The Community Kitchen, Food Bank of Larimer County, UMCOR Disaster Relief Prison Fellowship: Angel Tree, Christmas Giving and Gifting: Food Baskets/Harvest Pointe residents and church family members, Pura Vida, Guatemala, Covenant Partner Relationships with missionaries in Kenya, Zimbabwe and Oklahoma. [\$2500.00 each].

The congregation held a "virtual" Work Team with Pura Vida: 26 persons contributed to have a home constructed for Manuela and her grandsons in July with our Pura Vida partners.[\$6500.00+].

The Mobile Laundry Truck ministry has resumed, a collaboration with Homeward Alliance. The Truck is at the Library each Thursday and FUMC Loveland on Fridays.

Exploration for Shower Ministry for Homeless persons in collaboration with the Salvation Army was begun in early summer. It is still in planning discussions.

These are the "big rocks." Countless additional acts, gifts and hours served complement these to compose the whole pallet of mission and service ministry of the people of FUMC Loveland May God be honored!

Many thanks are raised to God and to each of the committee members for their servant hearts.... and to the congregation who responded to the "call."

The year began as normal as one could expect in the middle of a global pandemic but soon became anything but routine.

January began with training for SPRC members conducted by Rev Steve. Each member of SPRC was assigned to serve as a staff liaison for a member of the staff throughout the year.

In February, Rev. Steve announced he would be retiring in June, and we were off and running. We spent considerable time updating the church profile, a lengthy document which reflects the needs, characteristics and opportunities for mission of the church and is consistent with the Church's statement of purpose. This tool is used by the Bishop and Cabinet in making a pastoral appointment to a church. In April we met with District Superintendent, Tezenlo Thong, to review the Profile initially and again when Rev. Leslie Wood was officially appointed to FUMC. We completed the evaluation for Associate Pastor, Lee Anderson-Harris which was submitted to the district office. We also completed an exit interview with Rev. Steve Goodier and expressed appreciation for his years of excellent leadership at FUMC. The June Farewell Celebration for Rev. Steve and his wife Bev, organized and executed by SPRC, was well attended.

Soon after we said good-by to Rev. Steve, we held a *Getting to Know You* Reception for our new senior Pastor, Rev. Leslie Wood and her husband Brian, officially welcoming them to FUMC. Additionally, several "Meet & Greets" were held over the next several weeks, providing opportunities for members of the congregation to visit with Pastor Leslie in an informal, smaller group setting.

Amidst all the farewells and welcomes, we advertised for, interviewed and hired a music coordinator (Kathryn Peiffer), and a Children's Director, (Shannon Heusinkveld). We also interviewed and hired an interim choir director, (Chris White) to serve from September, 2021 until May, 2022. A permanent choir director will be hired next summer to begin in the fall of 2022. Mikeal MacBeth, A/V Technician, resigned his position in late November, so we are actively seeking applicants to fill that position.

We negotiated office space in the church for the Director of Senior Ministries, (Shirley Reed) and the family Ministries Director, (Jessica Gartner.)

A formal interview was conducted for ministry candidate Matthew Utley. This is the first step in a candidate's path to becoming an ordained clergy. Completed forms were sent to the District.

As with all church committees, we have spent a great deal of time crunching numbers preparing the SPRC budget for submission to the Finance Committee.

A holiday brunch is being planned for the staff in December as a small token of our appreciation for the generous, caring and dedicated people who lead FUMC in carrying out the mission and ministries of the church and its' people.

Finally, a special note of appreciation to those who have served on the SPRC Committee this year. It has been a year like no other and they have graciously stepped up to the plate, meeting often and sometimes on short notice to do the work of the church. Heartfelt thanks to each of you!

#### TRUSTEES REPORT

The major project for the Trustees this year was repaving the parking lot. During snow removal last winter there was significant damage to the parking lot. It was found that there were several sections of soft unstable soil. This soil had to be removed and replaced. The parking lot was finally finished in July.

A major leak was repaired in the roof above the balcony. The air conditioning unit for the sanctuary was repaired. Exterior lighting around the church was installed. Plants and a new statue were placed in the urn garden. A new refrigerator was purchased for the rental house.

The 5Ms were able to save the church a considerable amount of money by doing several repairs themselves. These included:

Replacing the air compressor that runs the pneumatic valves in the heating system.

Repairing the drinking fountain in Coy Hall.

Repairing several cracked drain pipes in Coy Hall.

Repairing the urinal in Youth Range.

Replacing the brakes on the Suburban.

Removing bats from the vent above the urn garden.

Trimming broken branches from the tree in the playground.

Installing new parts in several toilets.

These tasks were accomplished in addition to the normal maintenance of painting, changing light bulbs, clearing weeds and leaves, etc.
